- Connect with other librarians and YA literature enthusiasts
- Share my experience of working with high school students, from varied backgrounds and appreciations of reading. To share a unique view of high school curriculum at a high achieving suburban high school, especially as it relates to the growing acceptance of young adult literature
- Strengthen BHS's collaboration with Robin Brenner, the Young Adult Librarian at the Brookline Public Library, who will be attending and presenting at the symposium
- Present findings from the conference to district librarians and BHS faculty
- Purchase new YA titles for the BHS Library, funded by our budget
- Promote new titles to students and faculty

3. Context

a. What experiences or needs have led you to apply for this grant?

The BHS Librarians regularly work with English teachers and their classes to introduce students to new literature. Our knowledge of the curriculum and breadth of reading enables us to make connections between classic literature and young adult literature. Long before *The Hunger Games* became a phenomenon, the BHS Librarians picked up the buzz from library colleagues and read it. We quickly shopped it to individual students, teachers and classes. It's great to be ahead of the curve, but it isn't easy. I read reviews, discuss books with students, visit book stores and the Young Adult room at the public library, and attend the annual Massachusetts Library Association conference. But, I have never had the opportunity to immerse myself in a conference where the sole topic is young adult literature.

b. How have your education, training, and/or classroom experiences prompted the interest or need for this project?

I have taken several graduate level courses devoted to children's and YA literature. I work with BHS students, on a daily basis, either individually or in classes, to help them choose books for recreational and/or assigned reading. There has been a steady increase in the number of English and Social Studies (historical fiction)

teachers who are asking students to choose independent reading books. As school librarians, one of our roles is to provide a collection that is current, popular and well written, in order to appeal to our diverse population of student readers.
